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

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Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

116 Southville Road rises three stories from a granite foundation. The building is four bays deep and the windows are original. The entrance on the facade is flat-roofed and the door is original with sidelights. The wood-frame exterior has been replaced with aluminum siding and there is a shed-roof dormer on the third story. This building has a rear addition to the south and a one-story gable addition to the west, both additions having concrete foundations. The asphalt-shingle roof is a gable with an open rake. There is a pair of interior brick chimneys on the ridge of the roof. 116 Southville Road is typical of its surroundings and lies in a residential neighborhood.

116 Southville Road was constructed during the Late Industrial Period (1870-1915), when agriculture and manufacture flourished in Southborough until the early twentieth century. The Boston-Worcester Railroad was continually upgraded and the villages of Southville and Cordaville remained the main industrial areas of Southborough. Southville Road supported a string of residences, housing the population working in the town's boot and shoe industries.
