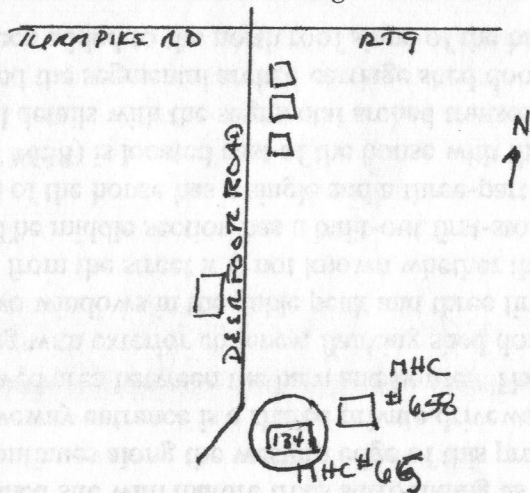

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The Hildreth Farm is at the end of that part of Deerfoot Road south of Turnpike Road (Route 9), although the road extended farther south and west throughout the nineteenth century. The house and barn are on a well established site with mature trees surrounding as well as trimmed shrubbery. The paved road ends and the dirt road continues along the western edge of this property which is marked by a low stone wall as well. Presently the driveway entrance is a shared private driveway which runs slightly north of this property and turns in to lead to a paved area between the barn and house. The earliest section probably is the gable roof west end of this dwelling with exterior chimney, flanking shed dormers with small six-light windows and a northwest gable end with two windows in the gable peak and three first-story windows. The dwelling has been substantially altered so that from the street it is not known whether the original dwelling had a gable front facade oriented toward the barn. The middle section has a built-out first-story entrance and second-story paired windows. The eastern most section of the house has a single and a three-part modern window at the first story level. The gable front barn (MHC #658) is located east of the house with the driveway between the two buildings. The barn has Colonial Revival details with the segmental arched transom over the large centered sliding door, the paired sash in the peak and the segmental arched carriage shed doors on the attached garage. A shed roof dormer and chimney have been added to the north roof slope of the barn.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

This short spur of a road appears on the earliest 1831 map with three houses at that time of which only the Fay House at 135 Deerfoot Road remains. This property was not constructed until after 1857 at which time it did not yet appear on the map. By ca. 1870 when **Lawson Hildreth** had this simple house on a two and one-half acre lot it was only the fourth dwelling on this road. Today only two of those four remain. By 1881 Hildreth also had a barn on his property. The road extended slightly farther south to one of the Deerfoot Farm Company properties which is no longer extant. Today remnants of that part of the road remain unpaved and running along the western boundary of this property. By 1900 Hildreth, who was listed as a carpenter in the Street Directory, lived on the road to Fayville. However it is known that he owned this property from ca. 1870 to 1898. Also in 1900 a Charles C. Hildreth who lived on McQuarrie Road, now known as Clifford Road at the north end of Deerfoot Road, was listed as a carpenter. It is possible that this family of carpenters built this house prior to 1870. After Hildreth this property may have been connected with the **Fay House** at 135 Deerfoot Road as a farmer's house or the house in which Waldo A. Fay, administrator of John A.J. Fay's property. He remained on Deerfoot Road in a modest house with barn after Fay's twentieth century successor at 135 Deerfoot Road had arrived. Additional research would be necessary to determine whether there was a connection between the two properties.

Statement of Significance by Schuler/Forbes, Consultants
The criteria that are checked in the above sections must be justified here.

The Lamson Hildreth House is one of only two remaining properties on this section of Deerfoot Road that is reminiscent of the argicultural past of the area. Although the main house has been altered it retains it setting and barn and displays the effect of the Colonial Revival period on rural farmhouses. This property is eligible for listing only as part of a district with the Moses Fay House at 135 Deerfoot Road. It retains integrity of location, setting, design, association and feeling.

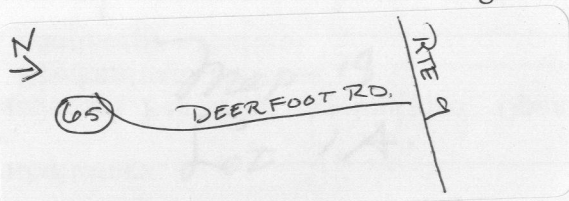
