Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

An important survivor of the handful of small commercial blocks which stood on lower Main Street in the early part of this century, in spite of some changes this building is unusually well-preserved for its type. It is a long two-story rectangular wood-frame building with a flat roof. The main facade has three large 6-over-1-sash windows with molded surrounds at the second story, and a typical early-twentieth-century storefront arrangement at the first, where two large display windows flank a deep, recessed center entry. The windows, which continue around to the sides of the building, appear to be multi-light replacements. They slant inward to the main entry, which has a modern glass-and-aluminum door, creating an enclosed entry vestibule. Above the windows and entry, the frieze and cornice of the storefront are intact.

The east side of the building has three asymmetrically-arranged 6/1 windows at the second-story, and five small windows at the first, plus a modern door in a projecting entry bay at the rear corner. The west side of the building is dominated by a two-story enclosed exterior stairway. In spite of the siding replacement, the building retains its bracketed roof cornice, with molded frieze.

This wood-frame store block is one of several commercial buildings constructed on the lower section of Main Street in the first two decades of the twentieth century. In its early years it housed the general store of **Henry Young**, who ran it with his brother-in-law Jack Hill, selling groceries, hardware, and paint. The larger 1904 Masonic Block down the street at the corner of Boston Road burned down in 1914, leaving this building and 4 Main Street as the only story store blocks of their type in the east part of Southborough center.

In the the 1930s and 1940s the building was owned by Walter Concannon, and housed Concannon's Spa and News Shop, which later relocated to Marlborough. Its ice cream parlor was run by "Red" Maguire for many years. It currently houses a real estate office.

Young's Store is eligible for the National Register at the local level as a contributing property in a district encompassing the historic residential and institutional meetinghouse center of the town. Under Criterion A, it is significant as one of few surviving properties at Southborough center that has been commercial in use since the date of its construction in 1913. It also meets Criterion C as a well-preserved example of a simply-detailed two-story store block of the early twentieth century.

In spite of some alterations to its storefront and west side, the property retains integrity of location, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, setting and association.
