One of the few properties in the immediate area that was not relocated at the time of the construction of the Metropolitan Water System is this four bay side gable dwelling that is oriented to southeast with the roadway passing its eastern gable end. The house is close to the road on a sloping lot that has mature trees and a post and rail fence delineating the road boundary. A brick foundation supports the dwelling that has been covered with asbestos shingles. The house consists of two and one-half story main side gable block a long rear one-story ell with an entrance facing the road and an attached two-car garage. A shed roof enclosed porch spans three bays of what was the main facade. The main entrance is screened by this porch in which there is a door opposite the house entrance bay. Windows have two-over-two sash with aluminum storms and vinyl shutters. The sash are set in narrow molded frames. The dwelling is one bay deep with two first story window, one second story and a single window in the gable peak. A tall narrow chimney is centered just behind the ridge. There is an entrance door into the long rear ell and the roof eave is extended to form a shelter. Kitchen windows are six-over-one with the same surround as the main house and a six-light window.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

From the early 1800s Valley Road extended north to meet an east west route that led to Southborough Center or to Framingham Road towards Marlborough. Historically there was only one dwelling on this road from pre 1830s and two by the 1857 map, not to become any more densely developed until the late 1900s. First known owner of this property was Peter Brewer who had married Sophia Nurse Brewer in 1819. Upon Peter Brewer's death which was in the late 1850s the house was split between his wife and their son, Charles N. Brewer (b. 1823). In 1860 mother and son were two of seven Brewers assessed for real estate. Charles Nurse Brewer had married Louisa Gadsby in 1848. The 1870 Assessors Report notes that the ownership of the house had been split in half, however the barn was divided in thirds with 2/3 to Charles N. Brewer and 1/3 to his mother, Sophia S. Brewer. Together they had 50 acres of land which is consistent with the next known owner. By 1886 Willis C. Newton owned this property - a 52-acre farm with house, barn and carriage house. There was a large barn on the opposite side of the street which probably was associated with this property. Newton had three horses and nine cows. He remained here well into the 1900s and in 1915 Newton, a farmer of 54 years old, still had a 52-acre farm with the same buildings and similar livestock. It is not known whether he acquired the farm as a 23-year old, inherited it through marriage, or had a father with the same name.
