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

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Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This asymmetrical three-bay, two and one-half story dwelling that rests on a granite block foundation is set back from the road and surrounded by new commercial and industrial development. The dwelling has been altered with the application of vinyl siding over asbestos shingles that show in the 1971 survey photograph. Windows have been replaced with vinyl four-over-four sash that appear to be smaller than the original windows. The main facade has a single window in the gable peak, three second-story windows that are not symmetrically arranged and two first-story windows next to entrance which is marked by a slightly projecting enclosed entrance porch with paneled door and metal storm door, and flanking full-length side lights. The entrance is just to the right of the center of the gable front facade. The full width open porch is supported by four posts each with vertical recessed panels. The south side of the building has four second-story windows, and at the first-story level, two windows, two doors and a projecting square bay window. All trim has been covered by the vinyl siding including corner boards, eave rake and returns in the gable end. The house has no chimney above the roof line at this time. The fire escape is attached to the rear of the building. Outbuildings include a large dilapidated barn with an attached shed and a mid-twentieth century building which appears to be used as an office.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Located on the main north-south corridor connecting the Village of Southborough with Cordaville and Southville, this property is consistent with mid-nineteenth century development. The first known owners were Fays, one of the best known local families for which Fayville is named. According to the Federal Agricultural Census of 1850 there were 118 farms of varying sizes in Southborough. This property was one of the mid-sized farms for which there are records from ca. 1850. Census and assessor's reports as well as directories indicate that the farm was owned by Benjamin Haynes Fay (1815-1884) followed by his son, Francis Augustus Fay (ca.1841-after 1918). Benjamin Fay, son of Moses and Elizabeth Haynes Fay, had married Virrilla A. Smith of Hopkinton in 1840. He had grown up at his parents' farm at 135 Deerfoot Road, the property that was inherited by two of Benjamin Fay's brothers, John A. J. and Charles S. Fay, by the mid 1800s. The 1850 U.S. agricultural census shows that the value of Benjamin H. Fay's approximately 80-acre farm was \$2500. Other information of interest found in this census report shows that he had horses, cows and swine and grew Indian corn, rye, hay, and Irish potatoes and also produced 500 pounds of butter from June 1, 1849 to June 1, 1850. Further, the 1857 map shows Benjamin H. Fay as owner who was assessed in 1860 for \$2200 worth of real estate and in 1870 for a 74-acre farm including a house, barn, wood house, horses, cows, one swine, and a carriage of which the real estate was valued in excess of \$2200 with the passage of ten years. Fay, like other local farmers, also did odd jobs for the Town. For instance in 1866 Fay was paid for 27 days of labor and use of his horse and cart to repair the roads. By the late 1890s the property had passed to Francis A. Fay who according to the 1897 assessors report had an 80-acre farm with house, barn, carriage house, horses, cows, hogs, and fowl. By 1909, Francis Fay, who is listed as a farmer, had a similar property with the addition of a storehouse. He continued to be listed as a farmer up through the 1913 street directories and and by 1915, at the age at 75 Fay had a three horses, eighteen cows, a bull, 100 chickens, house, barn, a carriage house, a storehouse, and seventy-seven acre farm. Benjamin H. Fay had a substantial farm by 1850 it is assumed that the house shown on the 1857 Map and the

assessor's records of 1860 and 1870 all refer to the same property and to this dwelling as well. In all likelihood the barn on the property replaced the mid-nineteenth century barn in the early 1900s. In the 1980s the property lost its acreage to ComGas office building and to the Town Transfer Station and Highway Department.
