

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Rising two-and-a-half stories from a concrete foundation, 160 Southville is a front-gable residence with a side-gable extension. The building is three bays deep, and its windows have been replaced. To the west, an open porch and entryway are supported by columns. Aluminum siding has been installed on the exterior of the building and the gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The roof is steeply pitched with a cornice and boxed rake. One interior brick chimney stands in the center of the addition.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the buildings, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

160 Southville Road was built during the Late Industrial Period (1870-1915), when agriculture and manufacture flourished in Southborough until the early twentieth century. The Boston and Worcester Railroad line was continually upgraded and the villages of Southville and Cordaville continued as the main industrial areas of Southborough. Southville Road supported a string of residences that were constructed to house the population working in the town's boot and shoe industries.
