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

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION see continuation sheet Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.
Set back from the road on a large houselot that once was part of a modest farm is this small gable roof dwelling with a two-story rear ell formed by the rear raised roof, and two small one-story side ells on the northeast end of the main house. The orientation is to the southwest with a full width screened porch across the gable end, which is the main facade with entrance door within the porch. This porch, which extends across the rear ell also, rests on a stone foundation and has heavy round columns supporting the hipped roof. Centered just behind the ridge is a chimney with one other at the ridge of the side ell. Windows have six-over-six and two-over-two sash with flat plain trim. The two second-story windows on the northwest side of the house facing the road have six lights only.

Woodland Road was one of the early roads from Ashland through what became Cordaville, however it did not
extend beyond Oregon Road just north of this property until 1846. It was only sparsely settled even by 1870 when this dwelling appears on the map. Thomas Cunneen (spelled Caneen on the 1870 map), first known owner, was appraised for \$900 worth of real estate in 1860. By 1870 he had a ten-acre farm with house, barn and three cows. By 1881 he had added a woodshed and three acres, and still was assessed for the same property in 1894. Patrick Toomey , farmer, who lived on the road from Fayville to Cordaville - Woodland Road - was assessed for the house, barn, wood house, and thirteen acres in 1897, thus the property changed hands between 1894 and 1897. However by 1903 only Dennis M.Toomey, a mason, was listed as living in Southborough and his residence was in Fayville. No further information about the twentieth century use is available at this time. Due to the size and inventory of this farm it is presumed that Cuneen and Toomey only farmed for their own needs and not for market products. The property was close to the Town Poor Farm and a district school in the mid 1800s.
