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



Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Rising two stories from a granite foundation, 166 Southville Road is a side-gable residence. Being four bays deep, this building is symmetrical and has retained its original sills and surrounds, although some of the windows have been replaced. A shed-roof extension lies to the south. Vinyl siding has been installed on this wood-frame house. The gable roof is covered in asphalt shingles and has a closed rake and cornice. 166 Southville Road is similar to neighboring residences.

#### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE see continuation sheet

166 Southville Road was built during the Late Industrial Period (1870-1915), when agriculture and manufacture flourished in Southborough until the early twentieth century. The Boston and Worcester railroad was continually upgraded and the villages of Southville and Cordaville remained the industrial areas of Southborough. Southville Road supported a string of residential buildings that housed the population working in the town's boot and shoe industries.
