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

Setting - Main north-south route connecting Cordaville and Southborough Center. Near mixed residential 1960s capes and some 19th c. farmhouses. Set up from the road with wooded area and ledge behind. Large open field on north side and house shielded by dense coniferous plant material on west and south sides.

This dwelling is best viewed looking south as it is heavily screened by tall and dense greenery on the south and west sides. The house, which has a gable end to the street, consists of a one and one-half story block, a series of two single-story rear ells, which connect the barn and the house. This second rear ell has a concrete block foundation and overlaps to connect with the north side of the barn. The original house has wood clapboard siding and the rear ells and barn are shingled. Although the gable end faces the street the house appears to be a side gable block facing south with the main entrance on the south side, where there are only two bays, a six-oversix window next to a paneled door set in a plain frame with a modest molding framing the surround. There is a long wall dormer across the southern exposure of the house with two pairs of six-over-six sash. The west gable end that faces Cordaville Road is three bays wide with two sash in the gable peak and two in the northern most first-story bay. Windows have six-over-six sash set in plain frames with dark brown metal storm windows. Narrow corner boards carry a wide rake with boxed cornice and returns. On the north side of the main block, there is only one entrance door with a modern multi-light door and a splayed exterior chimney that extends through the eave line and above the ridge near the front of this north elevation. The single-story rear ell has a six-over-six window and a small three-light window. This rear ell appears to be part of the original construction. And the rear ell on the concrete block foundation has a single two-over-two sash window and two small modern one-over-one windows. The attached barn once was free standing southeast of the house. Its orientation is perpendicular to the street.

From the mid 1800s there were scattered farmsteads along Cordaville Road, the major north-south corridor connecting the Southborough Center with Cordaville, once that village expanded in the 1840s. Until then Cordaville Road only extended from Southborough Center to just south of the Turnpike (now Route 9). This dwelling may have begun as a five-bay center entranced cape oriented to the south. First known name associated with the property is **William Holmes** who in 1860 was assessed for \$800 worth of real estate. The 1870 map, which lists occupations for many, shows W. "Homes" as a carpenter and builder and the 1870 Assessor's Report showed that he had a 21 ½ acre farm with house, barn, wood house and several horses. Also Holmes (aka Homes) paid taxes on an additional 48 acres known as C. and D. Newton land in 1870 and 1881. In the 1890s **Charles F. Fairbanks** had a modest house, barn, and carriage house on this 21-acre farm. Also he had a horse, cow and 40 chickens. The 1898 map shows the small house with rear ell and a barn not attached at that time. Assessors reports for Fairbanks in the 1890s and Holmes (Homes) in the 1870s and 1880s are consistent to be the same property. Past survey indicated that this property belonged to Graves (1870), however, the house bearing Graves name in 1870 appears to have been in the path of the Turnpike or very close to it. Thus the information for this property and for 188 Cordaville Road has been revised. According to Paul Lincoln's paper of 1926-1927 this was the residence of a **William Pinkham** in the 1920s.
