

High above Boston Street with the driveway off of Meadow Lane, this large two-story Queen Anne house that rests on a rubblestone foundation has been altered substantially by the application of blue vinyl siding, the loss of all trim and various fenestration changes. The house has deep setbacks that set it off prominently as the only house of its type in this area of Fayville and on Meadow Lane. The form is a hipped roof rectangular block with two and three-story projecting bays on the north and south sides and a three-story slightly projecting bay on the south side as well as a low shed roof addition extending from the west end of the house. Reported relocation of the house as well as alterations make it difficult to determine which is the main facade, however, there do appear to be stairhall stained glass windows on the north side and remnants of a hedge lined path leading to the door in the third bay or western most part of the north side. Most of the house has a slight second-story overhang. Most of the windows that remain from its construction and/or turn of the century move have two-over-two sash. The house is best described by considering each of its three bays starting from the Meadow Lane end where there is a small hipped roof enclosed entrance porch tacked onto the east end of the house, two irregular second-story windows and a hipped roof dormer. The projecting bays on the north and south sides are centered and distinguished by second-story overhangs and a squared bay over a polygonal bay. On the north side the projecting bay is three stories with a clipped gable and on the south side it is two stories with a hipped roof. The main entrance appears to have been altered and has two long windows with leaded lattice lights and stained glass lights next to the door. The roof has one small hipped roof dormer on the east slope. There are two tall chimneys; one in the first section on the north side and the other nearly centered on the ridge.

While the address for this property is Boston Road it is accessed by Meadow Lane, which was laid out in 1898 over land owned by Oren P. Walker of Marlborough and Charles F. Choate, Jr. of Southborough and was accepted by the town in 1899. At first Meadow Lane looped to have two road cuts onto Boston Road (Rt. 30). However, in 1909 that part that was east of the present street was discontinued from Boston Road at the house of Silas G. Allen (no longer extant) traveling north and then west to the house of Frank Goodfellow, 22 Meadow Lane. Past survey efforts state that this house was moved at the time of the development of the Sudbury Reservoir. However, it does not appear on the 1897 map, nor is there information about a former location. The house historically has been referred to as the Dorothy Dix House although this survey found no evidence to substantiate this information. Dorothy Dix is reported to have been a writer for the Globe and possibly used this as a retreat. Additional research is necessary to learn this property's past history.
