While later nineteenth-century additions have changed its overall shape, the Fay/Hayden House is still distinguishable as a good example of a small hip-roofed, two-story house of the Federal period, and one of only two of the type in Southborough. The main part of the house is one room deep, and has an asymmetrically arranged three-bay facade. One rear chimney rises from the southwest part of the rear roof slope. A long one-story wing with a shallow-pitched roof, of the same width as the main house, extends to the rear. Behind this wing is a narrower rear ell, with a small vestibule bay on the south side with a vertical-board door. A turn-of-the-century shed-roofed screened porch, supported on turned posts with saw-cut brackets, spans the facade.

The main entry, visible through the porch screening, is in the northernmost facade bay, and has a large-light glass-and-panel door that appears to date to the same era as the porch. The windows are largely 2-over-2-sash, with modern shutters. Several first-story windows have been replaced with modern 1-over-1-sash.

Close behind and to the southwest of the house is a wide, clapboarded gable-front barn (#640) on a fieldstone foundation, with two louvered cupolas mounted on the roof ridge. The barn now functions as a shop, and has a modern vertical-board walk-in door in the center of the facade, rather than a wagon door. Just touching the front southeast corner of the barn is a small one-story, gable-roofed structure, facing north--apparently a milk room (#641). Along the long south wall of the barn are two shed-roofed extensions. The larger one, toward the rear, is two stories, and has a band of modern windows on the south and east sides. In front of that is a shallower section, with an open cellar underneath. Most of the windows in the barn are 6-over-6-sash, fixed 6-pane, or 2-over-2-sash.

South of the barn is a picturesque fieldstone shed (#642) with a shed roof--possibly an early-twentieth-century vehicle shed.

This house was apparently built for farmer Lovett Fay (b. 1798) around the time of his 1824 marriage to Relief Russel of Marlborough, probably on land divided out from his family's holdings. He was the eldest of the twelve children of Brigham and Becca (Nichols) Fay, who may have lived directly across the street at 25 Jericho Hill Road (see Form #13). It is likely that Lovett Fay was involved in the operation of a small sawmill called Fay's Mill, which is shown at the edge of a pond behind the house on the maps of 1831 and 1857.

By 1870 the pond and mill were no longer in existence. The farm here then measured thirty-five acres, and its owner was **Francis W. Hayden**, who at that time was serving as a Selectman, an office he held for several years. He was a small dairy farmer, with a herd of six to ten cows in the 1870s. Later owners of the farm included **John M. Roach**, and by 1897, **Martin Roach**, apparently his son. Martin Roach still had a dozen cows in 1909, on thirty-one acres. Later owners included the **Hastings** family. In this century the property was called Wolf Hill Farm.

The Lovett Fay House meets Criterion C of the National Register at the local level as a rare example in Southborough of a small single-pile, hip-roofed, two-story Federal style house.

The property is also significant under Criterion A as a thirty-five acres, sizable remnant of one of the many prosperous mid- and late-nineteenth century farms in the outlying agricultural areas of Southborough. Jonas Fay, owner of what was at that time a farm of nearly a hundred acres, was one of Southborough's more prominent citizens of his time, serving at various times as a Selectman, Assessor, Fence Viewer, member of the School Committee, and Representative to the General Court. He was also a Deacon in the Pilgrim Church.

The house retains integrity of location, design, materials, workmanship, setting, feeling, and association.
